Cushman, the assistant general manager of the San Diego County Water Authority; Chair of the Day Peter MacLaggan, Vice President of Poseidon Resources and Halla Razak, Public Utilities Director for the City of San Diego.

Dennis began by discussing our area's significant focus on diversifying our water sources through the making of significant investments in water infrastructure. In 1991, 95% of our region's water was provided by the Metropolitan Water District. That figure is currently 49% and in 2020, it will drop to 34%, thanks to infrastructure that includes the Canal Lining Projects, the Olivenhain Dam and Reservoir, the Twin Oaks Valley Water Treatment Plant, the Lake Hodges Projects, the San Vicente Dam Raise and the Carlsbad Seawater Desalination Pipeline Projects. Water is our most basic resource and water reliability has been a long standing issue for our area. We are in our third year of drought. The next three months do not look promising, and the probability for 2015 being an el Niño year is fading fast. Dennis believes our substantial investment in water infrastructure will pay off and help stem the impact of years of hot, dry weather.

Peter gave us an overview of the Carlsbad Desalination Project being developed by Poseidon Resources. This project was 15 years in the making due to obstacles including obtaining seriatim 6 permits from 6 different agencies and overcoming 14 legal challenges filed by project opponents. Construction on the plant is now 65% complete and should be finished by 2015. When at full capacity, this process will produce 15 million gallons of water per day, enough to supply 112,000 households.

Halla Razak followed with a discussion on the City of San Diego's work on Pure Water San Diego, the City's water reuse program. This ambitious program hopes to provide one third of the City's water by 2035, and produces extremely clean water that is more than fit for human consumption. Also in Halla's focus is caring for the City's 3,000 miles of underground water pipeline and 2,600 miles of waste pipeline. Some of these pipes are as old as 115 years, and the City is being proactive about replacing old tired lines with new reliable ones.

While we face perhaps a fourth year of drought, it is reassuring to know that our residents are doing better in conserving water. In 1991, the daily use per person was in excess of 200 gallons. Today, that number is down to 160 gallons. And yes, water rates will continue to rise, but probably not at the pace of the last decade. There is good news on the horizon.
