"Business As I Know It!"

When Jim Croce and I fell madly in love, I was an artist, a gymnast, a folk singer, a high school sophomore and thought business was a "four-letter word."

Determined to be a musician, when we discovered we were going to have a child, Jim wrote "Time in a Bottle" and many other hits. After 300 days a year for two years on the road, Jim's songs finally hit the top of the charts. We moved to San Diego so Jim could host the Johnny Carson Show and do a movie with Cheech and Chong.

But at the peak of his career, just a month after we had moved, Jim Croce died in a plane crash in Natchitoches, Louisiana. As a twenty-six-year-old widow and single mom, with both my parents gone, I had no idea how I was going to raise my son alone.

This is my story of how I survived, overcame obstacles, and risked a lot to gain it all.

As we heard earlier, the Old Globe will celebrate its 80th year. It was built in 1935 as part of the Pan-California Exposition and modeled after the famous Shakespeare's Globe theatre in London. They produce 14 plays annually with over 600 performances on three stages. It plays host to an annual Shakespeare Summer Festival on the outdoor Festival Stage under the beautiful San Diego skies. They have an ambitious schedule that can be viewed at www.theoldglobe.org.

An inspired partnership has developed between the Old Globe and Combat Arts, an organization that teaches art to returning Iraqi military veterans. Their works of art are on display in the Sheryl and Harvey White Theatre. In the near future, we will enjoy a "Globe to Go," where performances will be taken into the neighborhoods in libraries, homeless centers, senior centers, correctional institutions, on a Naval vessel, etc. Barry feels art belongs to everyone; that it starts conversations among people from all walks of life, it helps bond families that experience the arts together, and allows us all to appreciate what arts and culture bring to a community.

The Old Globe partners with USD in training young actors. They host an intensive Shakespeare summer course for teens, and they have a robust arts training program. It is Barry's goal to replicate El Sistema in bringing music and art to all the neighborhoods.

Next season will open with a Steve Martin musical and world premier, *Bright Star*. Barry and Steve Martin have worked together over the years and this is a play Martin has always wanted to produce. Lucky San Diego! We won't want to miss that one.
