A 21-year veteran in the biotech field, Brian currently serves as Associate Director of the Illumina Solutions Center. Among his responsibilities are designing labs for Next Generation Sequencing, leading a team of scientists who provide their clients with customized solutions as well as educating them on the benefits of their technology. Additionally, Brian and his colleagues have developed a successful program in which high-school science teachers can bring genomics to their classrooms and perform an actual experiment on their campus.

Pretty cool, right? But what does all this genomics stuff mean for us? In a word, everything. According to Brian, we are extremely close (like 5-10 years close) to solving some of the world's largest problems via genomic sequencing. By knowing our genome, we will be able to have better insight into family planning, learn about predispositions, inform proactive health management and guide therapy and drug choice. Essentially, more patients produce more data, leading to more discoveries and therefore better diagnosis. The holy grail of genomics is disease prevention. And if you're wondering how will we feed all these healthy bodies? Well, genomics is improving agriculture and food production, as well. It's literally everywhere. (OMG, just like us! Talk about full circle!!)

Past President **Bob Russell** closed the meeting with a touching tribute to **Russ Kirbey**. Survived by his loving wife and four children, Russ was a big man with an even bigger heart. The Braille Institute is what it is today thanks to Russ's tireless efforts and many years of service. Russ and his infectious smile will be missed.
