Bidding Adieu to Polio

Do me a favor. Hold up your hand and place your thumb and forefinger about a quarter-inch apart from each other. See that? It's indicative of how close we Rotarians are to eradicating polio from the planet for good. Thanks to

the generosity of many of you, we're even closer. In all, the Rotary Auction raised an estimated \$57,000. Thank you so much to all who helped!

The festivities actually began before President Chuck Pretto called the meeting to order with a bevy of gifts up for the silent part of the auction. Not including the artfully-crafted wreaths for sale by the checkin table, there were nearly 70 – yes 70 – items up for bid. The prizes ranged from car detailing and personal coaching services to get-away vacations and mountain bikes. I even saw a San Diego Central Jail tour and lunch with our own Sheriff Bill Gore. I would have tried to win it, but figured one visit for me was enough. I just wonder if it would be the same experience for me since I'd be on the other side of the bars this time (just kidding, Mom!). With the silent auction completed, the meeting came to order with an Inspirational Moment by **Jamie Moraga** followed by the Pledge of Allegiance and singing of America the Beautiful, led by Jack Anthony and accompanied by Greg Zinser. Bert Wahlen took his usual spot at the podium to deliver the news sponsored by Jim Jessop, and then President Chuck literally stepped back up (and I do mean up!) to the microphone for some announcements. He appropriately gave a hearty thanks to the Liberty Station Wait Staff as yesterday was our last meeting of the year at this great facility as well as the folks from the Military Affairs Committee who volunteered

for a half day Wednesday at the Armed Services YMCA Super Shopper Program. Chuck then welcomed four of our SDSU Rotaracts: Bobby Marsh, Samantha Sorce, Alex Padua and Kirk Sasaki. Next up was Cheryl Wilson and a call for help in hosting seniors at our Holiday Program next week. It's always a treat to have them with us and, in many cases, this will be their singular holiday event of the year. So if you can help out, please seek out Cheryl and thanks for making a big difference in the lives of our guests! Cheryl then gave way to Jim Jessop who took his seasonal fine for distributing his famous pocket calendars for 2014 with the traditional 8-point font that didn't get unnoticed by President Chuck who needed to break out his glasses to read it. Chair of the Day and grandfather to now six children, **Sid Tobiason**, came to the podium next with important advice that only a seasoned CPA could deliver. He told us giving more money than the actual value of any one of the items up for auction is still tax deductible. Moreover. using the item for work is a business expense. Stan eloquently spoke of his father's care for a young mother stricken with the disease who, despite her yearlong hospital stay, still raised three kids. Yet it was Stan's final story that took my breath away.


