Peter then brought our Chair of the Day, Cheryl Wilson, to the podium who graciously introduced our guest speaker, Richard Della Penna, MD, the Chief Medical Officer of San Diego-based technology company Independa. He discussed the growing issue in supporting seniors who desire to live as independently as they can while also supporting the dwindling population of caregivers who look after them. The numbers he conveyed were staggering. More than 250,000 people turn 65 years old each month and will comprise 20 percent of the U.S. population by 2026. In San Diego alone, there are 380,000 individuals over the age of 60 with the fastest growing segment of the region's population being people 85 years and older. More troubling is the projected number of caregivers for these individuals, estimated to be cut in half by 2050.

Dr. Della Penna outlined three strategies currently underway to solve this issue of caring for individuals who want to "age in place." He discussed the growing number of non-profit "villages" that are setting up support systems staffed by volunteers to answer the need of their senior citizen neighbors. Two such organizations already exist in the Tierrasanta and Scripps Ranch neighborhoods of San Diego. Technology, Dr. Della Penna said, would also play a role. Here he described platforms like the one his company is building that leverages existing systems within the home, such as television, phone lines and other such devices, to help seniors remember key events, such as when to take their medicine or when folks are scheduled to pay a visit. The technology will also help caregivers and loved ones know when a problem is occurring in the home before it becomes a bigger issue so they can assist in a timely manner. Bottom line, is a need to respond to this aging population in a way that allows them to enjoy a good quality of life where they want, when they want.
